Application for Grants

I. Background and Summary

1. **A brief description of the applicant's background;**

The Boy Scouts mission is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices of their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law. The Aloha Council embodies this mission through our vision to positively impact the lives of Hawaii's youth through Scouting's leadership development and outdoor education programs. Providing safe and attractive camps is an essential component of our program model. Improvements are needed in order to maintain and expand our outdoor programs.

Aloha Council operates three camp properties to offer a variety of camping experiences and locations to 12,000+ Scouts across Hawaii as well as non-Scout campers. The Aloha Council-owned camps to be improved include Camp Pupukea on Oahu, Camp Alan Faye on Kauai and Camp Honokaia on the Island of Hawaii. The camps currently lack adequate camping, shower and program facilities. As the camps have not had major physical updates since the 1960s, improvements to the camps have been a goal for years. The facilities are worn and we believe physical improvements will have an immediate positive impact on attendance at all camps. In addition to the camping facilities, the main Scout headquarters in Nuuanu is beginning to show its age with roofing and energy efficiency needs. A portion of the requested funds would be used to address needs at this facility.

Scouts learn by doing – and those are the lessons that tend to impact lives well into adulthood. The camping tradition, integral to the Scout experience, teaches teamwork and self-sufficiency while opening a door to the wonders of nature for young people growing up in an urban setting. The value of outdoor activities cannot be overstated: youth learn about themselves and their abilities, when they are outside of their day-to-day surroundings. Yet, Aloha Council camp attendance is not meeting expectations and research demonstrates getting youth involved in outdoor activities continues to be a challenge.

In the 2013 Recreation Participation Report published by the Outdoor Foundation, data supports the notion that to ensure healthy, active communities and a future for outdoor conservation, America's young people must be engaged in outdoor participation. Nationwide efforts to reconnect youth to the outdoors are critical to reaching more young people, increasing accessibility of outdoor recreation for all

Americans and educating future outdoor enthusiasts about the diversity of the nation's backyard.

Key findings of the report include:

- Introducing outdoor recreation and physical activities early in life has a lasting effect. Among adults who are current outdoor participants, 75% had physical education and 42% enjoyed outdoor activities in elementary school.
- Camping participation for youth ages 6 and older was lower than other outdoor recreational activities.
- Youth who do not participate in outdoor activities say they are not interested in the outdoors.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Camping and the outdoor experience are at the heart of Scouting. The Aloha Council has a strategic commitment to respond to current youth and family needs and bringing them all to our camps. Therefore, we have launched the Developing Leaders for Life Capital Campaign to ensure the quality of our facilities and the continuation of our programs. Our campaign goal is to raise \$4 million to improve camp facilities to increase camp attendance among older scouts, and add camp facilities and amenities to attract more Cub Scout (ages 6-10), family members, and non-Scout campers.

The most heavily used of these properties is Boy Scout Camp Pupukea which has operated since 1966 on a former military camp property. Some of the structures were built in the 1940's while others were built in the 1960's and early 1970's. In 2010, the EPA condemned 13 outdoor toilet "cesspools" which added urgency to the need for upgrades on the property. With this condemnation, a master plan was developed for the property and approved by the Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources in November 2014. The EPA mandate also affected Camp Alan Faye (5 outdoor toilets) and Camp Honokaia (11 outdoor toilets).

Our vision is that Aloha Council' Camps will serve as a premier outdoor program resource to families and the community throughout Hawaii. In order to achieve this vision, we must upgrade toilet and shower facilities, bringing them into compliance with the EPA and department of Health regulations. In addition, we plan to add facilities designed for families and a broader segment of the community. Finally, in order to continually attract our membership to our camps, we will make program upgrades including rehabilitating the pool at Pupukea, shooting sports facilities at all camps, and adventure/challenge courses at all camps.

Support from the state of Hawaii will enable the Aloha Council to complete the most critical improvements to the facility that includes replacing toilet and shower

facilities at all three camps, renovating the pool complex at Camp Pupukea on Oahu, and providing expanded program facilities at all camps.

The estimated cost of this phase of the plan is \$4 million with \$1.5 million coming from the State of Hawaii, \$1.3 million from private contributions, and the final \$1.2 million matched by a community foundation.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;
For the Boy Scouts' 12,000 plus children and families living in Hawaii:

Renovations to our camps will allow them to continue to operate in accordance with State and Federal Regulations. It will establish facilities that will serve the next generation of young people by providing outdoor education facilities, summer camps, leadership training centers, and day camp facilities year round. It will become a more desirable choice for Scout Packs to utilize in their year round activities.

Summer Camp is a weeklong summer camp experience for the Scouts. They sign up for different merit badges of their own choosing that include: swimming, lifesaving, camping, cooking, pioneering, orienteering, wilderness survival, Indian lore, environmental science, forestry, astronomy, leatherwork, woodcarving, basketry, archery, rifle shooting, shotgun shooting, first aid, emergency preparedness, weather, geology, soil and water conservation, composite materials, disabilities awareness and Hawaiiana.

The Council holds Adult Leader Training for its volunteers to train them on the outdoors, Boy Scout educational methods, communications, leadership and camping. NYLT is a National Youth Leadership Training for our Scouts where they learn leadership, communication, presentation methods, conflict resolution, team building skills and more. Wood Badge is an advanced adult leader training offered over a one-week period. It focuses on leadership, mentorship, ideals of scouting, communications, diversity, conflict resolution, childhood development and more.

Day Camp is a Fun Cub Scout program that develops our Scouts' creativity and physical fitness. It is a 2-3 day program where each day they participate in different events, crafts, skills, games and storytelling around a particular theme. Units also camp independently year-round and create their own programs utilizing the facilities that are available.

For the general public:

Renovated camp properties will allow them to be utilized by school groups, churches, and adult retreats. The options for camping are limited, especially on Oahu where the number of campgrounds designed for youth is small. Aloha

Council makes its camps available to community groups throughout the year as a part of our outreach to the community.

The improvements to our camps will also add jobs and provide much needed work for the construction industry across the islands. The types of projects envisioned will be perfect for small to mid-sized contractors who have not been able to benefit from the construction boom in Kaka'ako and other places where large scale condominium and hotels are being constructed.

4. **Describe the target population to be served; and**
Our target population is youth ages 6-20, their leaders and families. These families are represented throughout the State of Hawaii and span all socio-economic and cultural backgrounds.
5. **Describe the geographic coverage.**
The geographic coverage is the State of Hawaii. Approximately 12,000 Scouts and their families from Oahu, Kauai, Maui, and Hawaii Island utilize the Camps. The Camps are also utilized by hundreds of other Scouts from throughout the country and Pacific region. In addition, the Camp is utilized by various nonprofit organizations as stated above.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. **Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;**
The Capital Improvements are being managed by a six-member advisory committee. The Aloha Council volunteer President is Barry Taniguchi, President of KTA Superstores on Hawai'i Island who, along with Jeff Sulzbach, Aloha Council Scout Executive/CEO, will oversee the physical improvements to the camps funded by the Developing Leaders for Life, Capital Campaign. The Developing Leaders for Life Capital Campaign's goal is to raise \$4 million for improvements at Camp Pupukea, Camp Honokaia, and Camp Alan Faye.

The Council has just completed the planning process, which included architectural renderings, environmental studies, secured use permits as the council-owned properties are located on State of Hawaii Forestry land, and consultation with officials in preparation for application of building permits. We are ready to begin construction in 2016. Planning began in 2011 with the engagement of professional architects, engineers, and consultants to develop a master plan for the council properties. The Pupukea Master was approved by Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources. All land is owned by Aloha Council. The improvements are part of a 25-year master plan and are intended to serve the next

generation of young people. Implementation of the improvements will take place over a 2 year period.

It is projected that these improvements would be made within 12-24 months of receiving the Grant starting in July 2016. The order of work would include:

1. Remove non-compliant structures and bring camps into compliance with EPA and Health Department requirements at all camps.
2. Build family camp area for Cub Scout Camping and toilet facilities at Pupukea.
3. Maintain and enhance existing facilities including lodges at all camps, pool at Pupukea, and Scout Service Centers.
4. Provide funds for program equipment at all camps.

A committee of construction professionals from some of Hawaii's largest construction and consulting companies will oversee the work along with council staff. A professional architect and contractors will handle day-to-day responsibilities.

The Executive Board Vice President for Properties is Corey Matsuoka, an engineer for SSFM. He and the construction team will constantly monitor and evaluate improvements.

The Aloha Council has been operating camps since it was founded in 1910. In 2015, the Boy Scouts of America National Office classified the Aloha Council as a Gold Council – the highest rating possible and putting it in the top 10% of All Scout councils. In order to receive this recognition a Council must show a positive operating budget, demonstrate growth in the number of youth and units served, improve retention of youth, and provide quality programs that are measured in youth advancement, youth participation in outdoor programs and trained leaders.

Experience in Construction Activities

The Aloha Council relies heavily upon the expertise of the members of its Executive and Advisory Boards.

The Aloha Council has an active working Board, and many of its members are licensed in architecture, engineering, and construction. Collectively, they provide the necessary skills, abilities, knowledge and expertise to supervise and assist with this project.

Camp Pupukea (Island of Oahu)

The Aloha Council has developed the 65 acres of Camp Pupukea from its former use as a World War II Army camp high in the Koolau Mountains into a modern day Scout camp. Facilities include: Four campsites equipped with tents on platforms with outhouse latrines, five primitive campsites with outhouse latrines, trading post/craft lodge, campfire bowl, nature hut, horizontal climbing wall, both

low and high C. O. P. E. (Challenging Outdoor Personal Experience) courses, assembly yard, health lodge, Hawaiiana yard, archery / rifle range, quartermaster and storage building, a multi-purpose lodge with full service kitchen, commissary, pantry, a hall for dining, offices for administration and program, eight staff cabins, swimming pool with showers, two campsite shower facilities, changing rooms and bathrooms, maintenance room for pool filtration system, open pavilion, two large directors cabins, camp rangers residence with pole garage and storage units, parking lot, three water storage tanks, water pump room, and nature trails.

Camp Alan Faye (Island of Kauai)

Camp Alan Faye, also known as the Kokee Scout Reservation encompasses 29 acres near Waimea Canyon. The camp property is approximately five miles from Kokee State Park. It is used as a base camp, Troop and Pack weekend outings, Boy Scout Resident Summer Camp and for Staff Developmental Trainings. The annual two weeks of Boy Scout resident camp serves 150 Scouts and adult leaders. Facilities include: A two story cabin, administration office, storage and staff dorm structure, archery range, rifle range, campfire bowl, trading post / craft shelter, central shower facility and eight campsites.

Camp Honokaia (Island of Hawaii)

Camp Honokaia, 238 acres, is located in a dense tropical forest approximately three miles west of Honoka'a. The camp serves as a weekend outing for Troops and Packs, coordinated Day Camps, District Camporees, outdoor training for Boy Scouts and Webelos Scouts, Order of the Arrow functions, scheduled service projects, and a two week Boy Scout resident camp that serves approximately 250 youth and leaders. Facilities include: a multi-purposes shelter for dining, a full service kitchen, administration office, trading post / craft shelter, adult sleeping quarters and a health office, storage trailer unit for camp equipment, staff cabin, rifle range, archery range, campfire bowl, nature trail, Hawaiiana yard, activity field, two central shower units and nine campsites.

Aloha Council Service Centers (Island of Oahu and Hawai'i Island)

The Aloha Council Service Center on Oahu serves as the administrative headquarters for the council and contains executive offices, field service area room, Scout Shop, Presidents Hall for meetings, and a light storage. A satellite service centers is located on the island of Hawai'i.




